
Losing the annual Freshmen-Sophomore Brawl the frosh were compensated for their defeat by being treated to their initial party, the official welcome given by seniors.

BOARD OF MANAGERS





SENIOR HIGHLIGHTS


Despite the fact that difficulties prevented the seniors from having a class play, they engaged in many school activities, and represented Kingsburg in contests, conferences, and meetings away from home.



Seniors also did outstanding work over Radio Station KARM in round table discussions and other forensic activities.


On May 26 the seniors attended Baccalaureate and on the evening of May 29 they graduated, leaving behind them a record which stands high for students in the future years to follow and uphold.




SCORES . . . SCOOPS

Leading the Kingsburg teams were: Kenneth Vaughan, A Class; John McNeil, B Class; and Tsunco Shinmoto, C Class.




