## THE CLASS OF '47

And we are proud that, in spite of four years of mixing and blending, adding and detracting, our colors have remained pure and bright.
At the beginning of our freshman year, the only color on our paleltes was green-and that we were. But soon other colors began to appear-blue-for the studies we were sure we would flunk-but somehow, not many of us ever did. But now it is time for us to lift with trembling hands our brushes. dip into the paints we have blended these past four years, and start our murals of life.
