

DEDICATION

The story of Kingsburg is largely the story of its people and the surrounding agricultural area.

Swedish settlers began to arrive late in 1886 as the result of the visit to Kingsburg made earlier that year by Andrew Erickson, who had been sent by an "emigration society" in Ishpeming, Michigan, to scout California for a suitable agricultural location.

In 1886 Kingsburg was a "wide-open town," because of the high wages paid by the wheat farmers in the area. The immigrants from Sweden were always more interested in raising fruit than grain. It was largely they who started the trend toward orchards and vineyards.

Other Swedes followed the first ones in the next few years, so that their numbers probably account for the rise in the census from 88 in 1880 to 291 by 1890.

So the settlers came, some alone and others in groups, from far and near, to build their homes and live in our town.

It is to these people, and also to the many others who have played a part in the story of this community, that we dedicate the '54 Viking.

May those who read these pages pause, and be thankful to God for America, the land of opportunity.

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FOREWORD

The Wheatville post office was established in June, 1874. In November of that year the name was changed to Kingsbury, in February of 1876 to Kingsburgh, and in January, 1894, to the present spelling, Kingsburg.

Our town has changed not only in name, but also in character. From a wheat-shipping center in the '70's and '80's, it has developed into a thriving agricultural community.

Business and employment opportunities are kept at a high level. Industries include a peach cannery, a cotton oil plant, several cotton gins, plants for packing fruit and manufacturing stockfeed and farm equipment, two large wineries, a raisin house, and a tire-recapping plant.

During the peak season, employment reaches well over 1,000, the cannery alone having a payroll in excess of a half-million dollars.

Many people of Swedish descent have settled in Kingsburg, and once a year Kingsburg becomes a bit of the homeland of her Scandinavian forebears. The gold and blue

of Sweden bedeck the town, and businessmen, housewives, and children dress in costume for the annual Midsummer festival day.

Here, then, is the 1954 Viking, telling the story of both our school life, and of Kingsburg, "A real home town."

Elected by the people of the school district and entrusted with the guidance of KHS is a board of trustees composed of Henry Swanson, Gordon Satterberg, James Cassidy, Luther Linda, and A. E. Swanson. Working at what is often a thankless task, these men devote many hours to school problems.

Mr. Henry Swanson, Mr. Cassidy and Mr. Linda state that their main occupation is farming. Mr. Satterberg is the owner and proprietor of the Model Drug, and Mr. A. E. Swanson is president of the Sun Maid Raisin Growers Association.

ADMINISTRATION

Principal O. E. Ludlow was born in Inola, Indian Territory, which is now Oklahoma, in 1906.

Mr. Ludlow, who is of Scotch-Irish ancestry, has been in Kingsburg for three years. He was previously the high school principal in Portola, California, and in several high schools in New Mexico.

Prior to that, he served three years as a United States naval officer, taught girls' physical education, was runner-up in the Olympic tryouts in boxing in 1932, and coached the boxing team of his alma mater, Oklahoma A. and M. College, where he obtained his B.S. and M. S. degrees.

For their future success Mr. Ludlow's goal is to give students an opportunity to think for themselves in student government and other student activities without embarrassment or fear of retaliation from the administration.

Besides supervising the student council and the over-all program of the school, Mr. Ludlow is active in the Masonic Lodge, Eastern Star, Lions Club, and V.F.W. and is a member of the Methodist Church.

Vice-principal Peterson, who was born in Chicago, Illinois, came to Kingsburg with his parents in 1905.

Upon graduating from Kingsburg High School as valedictorian of the class of 1916, Mr. Peterson attended the University of California, where he received an A.B. degree and won membership in Phi Delta Kappa, honorary education fraternity.

Since his parents were born in Sweden and spoke Swedish, Mr. Peterson used that language before learning English. He reads at least one Swedish book each year.

Mr. Peterson, vice-principal since 1933, has taught mathematics in Kingsburg since 1922 with the exception of three years when, as an officer in the Army Air Force, he was an instructor of navigation and meteorology. He also served in the army in World War I.

Mr. Peterson is a member of the Kiwanis Club, American Legion, Baptist Church, and is a foreman in the receiving department of the California Packing Corporation during the summer.

New to KHS this year is Mrs. Doris Sherman, counselor. Mrs. Sherman has had experience in industrial work as well as teaching.

Mrs. Christensen, dean of girls, is completing her sixth year at KHS. Mr. Henderson, school auditor, came to Kingsburg in 1920. He taught commercial subjects here until 1948, and since then has been full-time business manager.

Also new at KHS is Mrs. Barnes, school nurse. Employed as school secretary is Miss Betty Greer.




The class enjoyed a skating party in Fresno on January 18, and also the hayride held in the spring.


The senior play, "On the Night of January 16," was presented to the public on March 25 and 26. The seniors also presented their class program in the spring.

The Senior-Freshman reception, held at Burris Park, provided a lot of fun for the two classes.





Miss Viola Leverich, girls' physical education instructor, served as adviser for the group and was assisted by Mrs. Anita Christensen, dean of girls.














The Varsity squad completed successfully the 1953 football season as they plunged their way through the Lindsay Cardinals to the championship of the Shasta League for the second consecutive year.














PEP LEADERS

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
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
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
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
