## BOARD OF TRUSTEES



Kingsburg High School district is represented by five prominent men who are elected by the community to carry out the school program and institute new policies as the need arises.

One of the main purposes of the board is to hire competent teaching staffs and admin istrators. The school board is required by state law to determine the length of the school year and fix the dates for the vacations.

Authority to make reasonable rules for the school government is given to the school board by the state.

Regular meetings take place the first Monday of every month when the members discuss the problems which eame up during the previous month.


Dr. Paul Nielsen, principal and district superintendent, came to Amcrica from Denmark the age of eight. He attended the Ann Arbor, Michigan, high school, and in 1940 received his A.B. degree from the University of Michigan.

After his graduation. Dr. Nielsen went into the United States Navy and served for five years. In 1948 he and his family came to California and Mr. Nielsen continued his education at the University of Southern California, where he completed his master's and doctor's degrees.

## ADMINISTRATION

Mr. Ejnar Peterson has the distinction of being one of the two members of the Kingsburg High School faculty who have served longest.

In 1905 Mr . Peterson came to Kingsburg from Chicago and graduated from Kingsburg High School in 1916. Upon receiving his A.B. degree from the University of California, he returned to K.H.S. and has taught here for thirty-one years.

His teaching career was interrupted only once when he served three years with the U.S. Army Air Force during World War II.

Since 1924 when the California Scholarship Federation was established at Kingsburg High School, the club has been in continuous existence.

Many C.S.F. clubs do not keep the records of those who had been members at the time of their graduation, but a file has been kept at Kingsburg High School, and the records of the graduates from 1924 to 1956 are available.

Among the activities of the C.S.F. are club parties and projects. The members are allowed one party each semester. This year a backwards progressive dinner served by the club's members was held the first semester. Their project for 1956 was to raise money for one or more one hundred dollar scholarships. In order to raise the money, the C.S.F. obtained permission to operate the popcorn machine at all home games.

For membership in C.S.F., all students must have ten points. A's count three points for solid subjects and one and one half for a nonsolid subject. A grade of B in a solid counts one point and one half for a nonsolid. Only semester grades are counted
