## Vikings remain the champions

Starting the year with good prospects of making the varsity eleven a winning leam, Charles Moore, KHS head varsity coach, along wilh Hal Jenkins and Dale Graybill, assistant coaches, led the boys through weeks of training and hard work and emerged from the practices with a championship team.
The game with Washington Union of Easton, the first of four nonleague games which the Vikings played, opened the '58 football season for KHS. Other schools that KHS played in nonleague competition were Orosi, Reedley and the Fresno High School Junior Varsity, all victims of Viking prowess.
In league competition, the Vikings walked off with the first game with Exeter by a score of 35 to 6 . The varsity continued their highpoint viclories over Sanger, Lemoore, and Dinuba.

A surprise to the league occurred when the Fowler Redcats played a topnotch game and held the Vikings to a $20-\mathrm{to}-20$ tie.
The major attraction of the season, not only for the two schools involved hut for the surrounding area, was the much-discussed SelmaKingsburg game. Selma was generally favored because of their allvictorious record compared with Kingsburg's record of six wins and one tie.
The Vikings and the Bears both played a good game that was witnessed by a sellout crowd. After a close and exciting battle, the Vikings came out the top team with the score 20 to 14 to clinch the league championship.

Service clubs of Kingsburg honored the Viking football squad and their coaches and managers at a banquet on December 9. A highlight of the evening was the presentation of the most valuable player award to halfback Truman Hawkins.

Hawkins and Dennis Palm were the 1958 co-captains for the football team.
