





Junior class members had a successful year of money-raising projects. All the money raised during the three years in high school went toward the Junior-Senior Prom and Banquet.


During the football and basketball seasons, juniors ran the concessions, which consisted of food, candy, and drinks. Viking pennants were also sold at the football games.




In keeping with KHS tradition, the class received their class rings on April 5. They chose the "Vanguard" ring with a black onyx set in gold.




CLASS OF '66

In the opening game with Caruthers the squad walked off with a 20-0 victory. This game was a practice duel.


In league play, the Norsemen defeated Dinuba, a victory unprecedented for the last three years.

High point men for this year were John Jones, with a season record of 202 and a league record of 129, and Jim Carlstrom. Jim's season record was 187, his league record 118.




CROSS-COUNTRY


J.V. WRESTLING


JV BASEBALL

Twenty-five boys reported for track on February 25. They were grouped into A, B, and C classes, coached by Mr. Lowell Draper and Mr. Larry DeLong.




