The Kingsburg Varsity Basketball team under new coach Felix Wilkerson compiled its finest record in the last six years by winning fourteen games and losing only five.

The mighty Vikings swept through their practice schedule beating Riverdale, Lindsay, Caruthers, and Sanger once each and Lemoore twice while losing only to Reedley in the finals of the Kingsburg Tournament.

The Vikings opened league play with a win over Fowler and continued on to an 8-4 win-loss record good for third place in the Central Sequoia League. The highlight of the season was a 45-44 loss to undefeated Reedley in the last six seconds of the game.

Coach Wilkerson had the pleasant problem of having six first stringers this year in Dennis Friis, Jim Carlstrom, Bill Nelson, John Jones, Doren Landseadal and Tom Olmos.
