







Social Science, World History, Driver Training, U.S. History, and Civics are classes which teach students the importance of knowing the past in order to deal with the future.


Faculty members of the social studies department are Sam Crandell, Elmo Hays, Bev Keith, Bill Wilson, George McKean and Chairman John Seaman.


Social studies is the only department of campus which requires that a student take four full years of classes.

Job training offered


The purpose of the Valley Regional Occupational Program, otherwise known as V.R.O.P., is to let students explore different occupations while still attending school.

Any junior or senior interested in a V.R.O.P. class may sign up, however, the class is particularly designed for those students who plan to get a job immediately following graduation.







Paul speaks out

Kingsburg High School once again experienced an exchange student during the year, his name being Paul Flamig. Paul is from Stuttgart, Germany, a city of about 600,000 people. Here are a few of his observations.

"I stayed with the Mr. and Mrs. Jim Snyder family which contains two boys and two girls. The oldest daughter Audrey, was this year's exchange student in Denmark, allowing me to attend Kingsburg High School this year.

"KHS life was completely new to me. In Germany I used to go to school from 7:45 in the morning till 1:00 in the afternoon, except one time a week when we had a couple periods in the afternoon. And that was it, whereas here, there are after school sport activities and a number of clubs. I went out for swimming here and I enjoyed several clubs also, such as CSF and Key Club. So I had no problems with my free time in Kingsburg.

"In July I shall go back to Germany to attend school for two more years, until graduation for me. It won't be easy since I am now so accustomed to the American way of life, and since I got to know and admire so many people."









Mexican Culture Club





Opportunities exist for girls in sports


The Girls Athletic Association had a very successful start this year. The first activity was to initiate the incoming freshmen girls, who did not seem too anxious to take part in the annual activity.





Bible Club gives a spiritual uplift







Many long hours were spent practicing on the Kings River Golf Course with high hopes of capturing the Central Sequoia League Championship from Exeter, defending champs for three years running.








Taking it easy

The spirit of '78 is alive, that's for sure. With their great artwork, and big mouths, the sophomores rarely left a pep rally without winning poster or yelling competition or both.


In homecoming activities, the sophomores came in third with 22 points. Kathy Chamberlain was the sophomore homecoming attendant.
