




On the first day of March the freshmen were the honored guests of the seniors. The main event of the evening was a comedy featuring Harold Lloyd in "Welcome Danger".



The "branding" of the new members marked the beginning of many enjoyable evenings together. Once a month a masculine "rough house" formed a diversion.


ORGANIZATIONS


