On October 12, 1934, Kingsburg High School embarked upon one of the most successful football seasons of recent years. Under the guidance of Coach Bunger the Vikings swept through the entire season undefeated and annexed the Valley title.

Buck Catlin, Viking quarterback, led his team-mates to victory in the first game of the season by downing the Kerman eleven. This was encouraging to the Vikings and the next three opponents were easily conquered.

The battle of the season came when Kingsburg fought a fighting pack of Red Cats for the division title.

Next, Kingsburg met the Laton team for the Fresno County Championship. After a rather one-sided contest the Vikings emerged victorious.

The Vikings were now in line for the Valley semi-final contest with Dos Palos as the opposing team. The invaders, who had come with such high hopes, were sent home after a 33-12 drubbing.

After the Dos Palos game only one barrier, the Corcoran Panthers. lay between the Vikings and the Valley title. They were finally disposed of, however, and the Vikings ended the season as the Valley Champs.

Thus ended a most successful season in which the Vikings piled up a total of 232 points to their opponents 24.
