Maury Nyberg Leaves His Mark on KHS

Maurice Nyberg passed away on April 18th, 2021 at the age of 95. He was looked up to as a role model in the Kingsburg community. He dedicated countless hours with the goal to help others, especially young students.

Nyberg graduated from KHS in 1943, and continued to stay involved with not only the Kingsburg community, but also KHS for the rest of his life. He advised KHS Key Club and Kingsburg Kiwanis alongside his wife, Pauline Nyberg.

World War II began in Nyberg's junior year of high school. He knew he'd be drafted, so he made the decision to enlist in the navy. He had to overcome many hardships while serving his country during such a dangerous time.

The first ship that Nyberg was assigned to was named the U.S.S. Jenkins which was hit by artillery from a shore battery. Six soldiers were killed, all on his first operation.

Another major obstacle he faced near the end of the war occured when his unit was bombarded and hit a mine. "We would've sunk but the sandbar barely saved us. We had to wait until we were discovered and then a bigger ship came to rescue us," Nyberg explained.

After the atomic bombs were dropped over Nagasaki and Hiroshima, Nyberg and his crew knew that the war was almost over. He served the rest of his time with a decommissioning team in San Diego until he was discharged in 1946.

Although he served as a safety consultant with the State Compensation Insurance Fund after the Navy, Nyberg impacted the community in many other ways. He played a big role in the Orchard Church, serving as the choir director and helping out whenever and wherever he was needed. He advised KHS' Key Club (a volunteering club) and was also a member of Kiwanis, a service club that empowers people to fundraise and partake in local service projects to serve the needs of children. He served as the president for the Kingsburg chapter in the past.

Kiwanis' motto is "Serving the children of the world," which Nyberg lived by. With Kiwanis, he helped with countless projects, both on the national or local level. Some of his bigger projects included getting iodized salt to countries that were

lacking iodine, which can cause developmental disorders. He also helped in getting tetanus shots to women in developing countries who didn't have access to sterile equipment during childbirth.

Local projects Nyberg led mostly involved fundraising so that Kiwanis could continue giving out their annual scholarships. One of his most recent fundraisers included a pancake dinner and a silent auction which generated a lot of scholarship money.

Nyberg lived in Kingsburg for all of his life. His grandparents moved to Kingsburg from Sweden. He had Swedish parents, who raised Nyberg and his two older brothers. He had three children, nine grandchildren, and 14 great grandchildren who continuously brought joy into his life.

Another hardship Nyberg underwent was when his first wife, Lorraine Ny-



berg, was diagnosed with breast cancer. She had a long, hard-fought battle, but lost when she was 67 years old.

Nyberg met his current wife, Pauline Nyberg, through Kiwanis. They shared similar passions and spent much of their lives helping the community. "If it wasn't for Kiwanis, our paths would've never crossed," Nyberg added.

Pauline Nyberg added, "Mr. Nyberg was always upbeat and happy and if things bothered him he did not seem to let it show. He gave the best hugs and had a nice, big laugh. He was generous with his time and loved life. He enjoyed all his volunteer work and was very proud to be associated with Key Club. Mr. Nyberg and I were so fortunate to meet at the stages of our lives when we needed each other. Despite our age difference, we enjoyed much the same things, including God, family, friends and being with them. We loved Kingsburg and happily worked together

to do our part to keep up its traditions. I know he would want the Kingsburg Swedish Days to continue and we both enjoyed hosting our large Nyberg family for Santa Lucia Day, which is the first Saturday in December. I also appreciated how he loved me unconditionally, and I him."

Nyberg always had a deep passion to give to others. "I enjoy being involved in community beneficial activities and serving the community. It's such a worthwhile feeling helping children of the world," marveled Nyberg. Nyberg was driven to help high school students which is why he dedicated so much time to Key Club.

KHS College & Career Counselor Kerry Peterson got to know Mr. Nyberg through Key Club and Kingsburg Kiwanis. She explained, "One of my favorite things about Mr. Nyberg

was his humility. He served others graciously- he got in there and worked! Even when he was in his 90's, he would lug water bottles for Key Club lunches or cook and clean at the annual fundraisers to raise money for KHS scholarships."

"I remember one Pancake Dinner night where he was the last man standing- truly. He (at age 90 or so) was mopping while all the rest of us gave out or went home. He never asked anyone to do a job he wouldn't do right along with them. His style of leadership that way made a deep impression on me. As far as a lasting impact, I would have to say that Mr. Nyberg showed me how much kindness matters. He had a way of making each and every one of us lucky enough to know him, feel like we're really quite special. And he made you feel that way each and every time he saw you. He truly loved

and was so proud of the students he served through Key Club. I will cherish those memories," Peterson continued.

Nyberg often advised Key Club members, "Study hard and find activities that will serve your community. Don't be so involved in things that would take away from you being active in your community because it really is worthwhile."

The Kingsburg community lost Nyberg on April 18th, 2021. Kingsburg honored him with a motorcade down Draper Street all the way through Downtown Kingsburg on May 5th, 2021. He received Military Honors as a large crowd arrived to support him. Nyberg was a huge inspiration to both young and old. He will forever be remembered, and his legacy will live on forever. Thank you, Mr. Nyberg, for all you did for KHS students and the Kingsburg community.

Mr. Steve Harness Retires After 34 Years a Viking

KHS teacher and overall extraordinaire, Steve Harness left a legacy here at KHS that will forever be remembered. Harness taught at KHS for 34 years, since the fall of 1986.

Harness taught a wide variety of courses at KHS. Although his main classes were Earth Science and Chemistry, he also taught one year of Biology, "green, slimy, and worms" as Harness calls it, Astronomy/Geology, and AVID for 24 years.

KHS will always hold a special place in Harness's heart and he was sad to leave. He adores all the memories and experiences he has had with students and staff here.

When asked how he felt about leaving KHS he said, "People say that you know when it is time to go and it is time. I really feel sad. The teachers, school, and community have made me feel welcome. A good part of me doesn't want to leave."

His experience at KHS was like no other. He interpreted, "I have been wonderfully blessed by this school everyday. We have a great, fantastic, wonderful group of science teachers. Their individuality, professionalism, and the care they show everyone goes beyond any other reward. We have a great group of teachers and staff at KHS who are truly compassionate about their students. The students are really great here."

Harness feels like his path to becoming a teacher at KHS was like no other.

He was born and raised in Illinois. He had really poor counseling in high school. His dad, who only had a 5th grade education, encouraged him to go to college. Harness knew he liked science, but was suspended twice in high school due to chemistry experiments. His father couldn't afford putting him through a university so he worked during the

summer and attended Illinois Community College for two years. It was here that he became intrigued in the Earth and the natural world around him. He transferred to Bradley University in Illinois where he graduated with honors and a bachelor's degree in Geology along with his teaching credential in 1974. His initial plan was to work for Texaco but that didn't follow through.

He elaborated, "With my degree in hand, I was planning on working for Texaco but that changed and none of the oil companies were hiring

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geologists. I was working in retail business and the company promoted me and moved me to California. After I left the retail business, I started teaching. I went to Fresno Pacific and earned a Masters in Math & Science Education."

He was involved in numerous activities during his 34 years at KHS. He coached Boys Tennis for 15 years, coached Mock Trial, was the Science Club Adviser, was the MESA Adviser, was the contact person for the Upward Bound program out of Reedley College, was the Science Department Chair, and was deeply involved in AVID.

He remarked, "I started teaching AVID in 1989 then became the Coordinator. As Coordinator, I helped organize university field trips, fundraisers, concessions at sports games, car washes, and especially the Christmas Families. This started small with AVID and a few clubs but became a major event for the entire school."

There were many proud moments that stood out to Harness. One moment that felt special to him was having a group of MESA students win first place in every event at the MESA Regional Competition.

Watching his 8 classes of AVID students finish and graduate high school also made Harness feel proud. He read their names out loud as they received their diplomas. He is also very proud of his past students who now have successful careers. Several of them are teachers at KHS and he is glad that he was a part of their educational journey.

Harness left an impact on so many students on campus. One student said he was known for telling the best dad jokes and playing the Eagles Greatest Hits. According to a student, he also was so passionate about his job and made students want to actually do their work. Another KHS student noted how much he loved Mr. Harness's quote "Do Smart, Don't

do Stupid."

KHS staff and students will miss seeing Harness on campus. They will miss his dad jokes and all his fun stories.

Harness had many accomplishments at KHS. He left a huge impact here that will be missed. KHS wishes the best to Harness in his future and sincerely thanks him for all of his service.

KHS Summer School Goes Online to Accomadate High Numbers

This year at KHS they are offering multiple summer school classes. It's going to be different from the other years that KHS has done summer school Administration is trying to offer the best possible options for all students.

Administration has answered a lot of the

questions people may be wanting to ask. They tried their best to give as much detail as possible.

"This year's summer school will be through Edgenuity," stated KHS Assistant Principal Heather Wilson. KHS has used this site before. It will be just like last year. Students have to keep track of their school work or they may fall behind very quickly. Students will have to do work daily and keep up with their class as much as they possibly can.

When a student completes a whole class, they will receive 5 credits per semester that they complete. "If you have to take both

semesters of that class then they will be getting 10 credits for that class in total," stated Wilson.

Students may also take two different classes for summer school but that's only if they

need one semester of those two classes.

"The summer school applications were due on April 9th." Wilson said. If students signed one and turned it in, they are set and ready for summer school. Students needed to just fill out that form and turn it into Mrs. Hale.

"For summer school there will be an assigned teacher for students to go to if they need



any help with that class," explained Wilson. If a student needs help in any way, shape, or form, they can email the teacher they are assigned with. There will be about 30-35 students in each class.

The teachers will be very helpful to the students. They will try their best to help all of their students, but it is important to keep in mind that there are a lot of other students that may need help too.

Any student at KHS can take a summer school class. They just needed to sign up for that class before the deadline. Students can take

summer school to get ahead of a class or if they failed a class.

"This year at KHS over 600 students have signed up to take a summer school class. Due to the classes having to be cut down in size not all students will be able to attend a class this summer," stated Wilson. It's a struggle to not be able to get into a summer school class but there is always next summer for students to do so. Students have 2 weeks to complete a semester of a class. That being so they can complete two semesters or even a full year of a class in just 4 weeks," explained Wilson.

Summer school will be a challenge for some students due to not being in person, but Vikings always make it through. Have a great summer KHS, go Vikings!

On Tuesday, April 14th, a field represen-

tative for David Valadao presented the Congressional App Challenge Award to sophomores Lorne Rogers and Breton Pumarejo.

The challenge itself is rather self explanatory. Over 6,500 students registered and submitted nearly 3,088 apps of different functions to be judged.

Contest winner
Lorne Rogers stated, "Our app (v.Task) is a scheduling/reminders app for students.
It can add events to a checklist, set reminders that access the phone's 'clock' feature (it'll alert you when the set time is passed). It also has helpful tips that students can

access if they need pointers on how to manage their schedule. It also has a page where you can email developers, change the color theme, etc."

The two student coders had worked on the app for a little over a month for their computer science final projects. They then heard about



the app challenge and decided to enter it into the competition.

This is not the first time that students from KHS have entered and won this competition. Rogers added, "I speak for myself and my partner when I say I'm honored to have been able





KHS Freshman Alexa Covarrubias said, "Some advantages are that we get out a lot earlier than normal, we get in person instruction after so long of being online."



Cross Country


The KHS Cross Country team had four meets for their spring season. The meets were the CSL


Swim & Dive


Marrisa Gonzalez, a KHS senior, has broken the record for home runs at the KHS
