The theme of Sweethearts was also clearly evident. From the moment students walked in and saw the red, white, and pink balloons to the large "LOVE" sign by the DJ stand.



Pacheco said, "I've done it every year so do it for senior year. I'm excited. I've never played a Disney princess, so it will be a good experience."


Noh was asked why he decided to audition for another play he stated, "What made me want to join was because last year's play was fun and I decided to join again this year."



Math teacher Mike Manley nominated Sophia saying, "Sophia has been consistent in her studies and has had great success. It is a pleasure to work with her in class."









The Fresno City College Future Nurses Program has officially accepted two KHS Senior CNA students. These two hard working students are Sullivan Phelan and Macie Oehlschlaeger.

The program at Fresno City College serves a cohort of 20 students every year. The Future Nurses program is a collaborative effort between Fresno City College and Fresno and Valley Regional Occupational Programs (VROP).

Benefits of the program include academic support, guidance and mentorship, as well as, priority registration for classes and special courses. One of the biggest advantages to being accepted into this program is being pushed right into the RN program as soon as students finish the required classes and there is availability in the program.

In order to apply to the program students must be in an ROP CNA class, have a minimum of a 2.5 GPA, and write an essay explaining why they want to be a nurse. Candidates must also fill out and submit an application.

Senior Sullivan Phelan was asked about what it takes to get to the top of the candidate pool and be selected. She said, "In hopes of becoming a top candidate in a very large pool of contestants, I wanted to make sure that the Program Directors knew how much I wanted to be a part of their program."



Computer Club's E-Waste Recycle Event a Success!

On January 20, 2024, an E-Waste Recycling Event was hosted by Joshua Woods' Computer club. It ran from 8am to 2pm, with three different shifts for the Computer Club's students to sign up for.

When asking Woods what this E-Waste Recycling event was hoping to accomplish, Woods said that "The Computer Club partnered with Xtreme Green Recycling to offer this event to the community. This is our 2nd year offering the event and we've had positive feedback from the community. The data destruction that we perform at the event involves crushing the hard drives."

In total, twenty-three of the Computer Club's students came to help throughout the six hours that the recycling event took place for. A variety of electronic devices were brought in, with the most common ones being TVs, desktop computers, laptops, and cell phones. Computer monitors and T.V.s were taken to be re-

cycled, with the computer harddrives being taken out and destroyed.

When asked how the electronics were repurposed, Woods said "Some of the electronics are refurbished and resold. Others are dismantled so that valuable metals like silver, palladium, and platinum can be salvaged and reused to make new devices. On the environmental side, many electronics contain toxic substances like lead and mercury that can pollute the soil, water, and air if not recycled properly."

Following that question up, he was asked roughly how many devices were recycled. He responded with "I don't have a number of how many electronics devices were recycled, but we did have approximately 100 community members drop off electronics to be recycled."

I agree with Baca and think there should be more foreign language options. Lots of students at KHS want to go to a four year university and in order to do that you need 2 years of a foreign language. We all


and then getting to eat it afterwards would be enjoyable but also a learning experience."



Superbowl LVIII: Chiefs Win Back-to-Back in Overtime

The last six seconds of overtime resulted in the Kansas City Chiefs win of Super Bowl LVIII. The most popular showdown of the year occurred on February 11, 2024 between the San Francisco 49ers and the Kansas City Chiefs in Las Vegas, Nevada at Allegiant Stadium.

The Chiefs won the coin flip where they deferred and decided to kick off, letting the 49ers have the ball in the opening play.

The 49ers quickly flew through the field until Leo Chanel, the Chief's linebacker, stripped George Karlaftis causing the ball to fall for the Chiefs at the 27-yard line.

Soon after, 49ers defensive end Chase Young reached the O-line, reaching Mahomes which led to a forced second-and-14, leading to a Chiefs punt.

With the start of the second quarter, Brock Purdy completed a pair of competitions to wide receivers Chris Conely and Ray-Ray McCloud that had a combined 37-yards, allowing the 49ers to get close to Moody. This action allowed Moody to set a Super Bowl record setting field goal of 55 yards.

Immediately after the field goal, Patrick Mahomes completed a 52-yard pass, getting the Chiefs into the red zone.

Nearing the end of the second quarter Purdy threw the ball to Jennings, who bolted through Chiefs defense for a 21-yard touchdown setting the score to 10-0 with 49ers in the lead.

Within the last 23 seconds of the second quarter Butler from the Kansas City Chiefs got a 28-yard field goal setting the score to 10-3 leading the game into Usher's halftime.

Usher Halftime

The 2000's R&B artist known for hits such as "Yeah!" and "DJ Got us Fallin' in Love," Usher took the stage to perform the 2024 halftime show.

Usher presented a show stopping 13-minute concert bringing on fellow collaborators and friends such as Alicia Keys, H.E.R., Will.i.am,

Lil Jon, Jermaine Dupri and Ludacris. Usher also played 13 of his classic songs like "My Boo" with Alicia Keys and "Bad Girl" while roller skating across the stage.

Usher did not disappoint fans with his show and was a great addition to the game.

Quarters 3, 4, and Overtime

With the start of the third quarter Mahomes was intercepted by Ji'Ayir Brown which quickly turned into the 49ers taking over the Chief's 44-yard line.

With 5 minutes on the clock, Mahomes thundered through a 22-yard carry and passed the ball onto Butler who made a 57-yard field goal setting another new Super Bowl record, setting the score at 10-6. Three minutes later Mahomes followed through and got a 16-yard touchdown for the Chiefs with a score of 10-13, ending the third quarter.

With that, the fourth quarter began where Purdy hit Jennings, Deebo Samuel, and Brandon Aiyuk for three completions for a combined 46 yards. After two plays, Purdy and Jennings joined together for a 10-yard touchdown, but the extra point was blocked only giving them 6 points.

Mahomes and Kelce joined together for two completions for a combined 29-yards before the quarterback connected with Justin Watson for a 25-yard gain leading to a 24-yard field goal causing the game to be tied 16-16.

With two minutes left, the 49ers completed a 23-yard completion to Jauan Jennings, which later stalled, but Jake Moody continued it on with a 53-yard field goal breaking the tie at 19-16.

Within the last minute of the game, the Chiefs were able to reach the red zone when Mahomes hit Kelce for a 22-yard gain with only nine seconds left of the game. A 29-yard field goal from Butler sent the game into overtime, only the second time ever in NFL history, 19-19.

The 49ers started off overtime and entered Chiefs territory where Purdy hit McCaffery and sprinted back for a 24-yard gain. Jake Moody hit a

27-yard field goal, his fifth of the game and making the score 22-19.

Soon came the last 13 seconds of the first quarter in overtime where Mahomes extended the game for the Chiefs with an 8-yard carry which got them into the red zone with a 19-yard carry. After 3 short plays, Mahomes got a touchdown making the final score 22-25. This touchdown both marked Mahomes as MVP for two years in a row, but also marked the Chiefs win for the second year in the row, and the third within five years.

Taylor Swift Controversy

American Popstar Taylor Swift has entered the NFL scene due to her new relationship with Travis Kelce, the Chiefs' tight end. Her entrance into the NFL has come with mixed reviews though between die hard "Swifties," football fans, and the NFL itself.

Swift's fans, titled "Swifties" have loved seeing their favorite singer on live television and outside of her world tour titled "The Eras Tour." They've enjoyed seeing her in a perspective that hasn't been shown in years, her being a human living an average life.

Young fans' parents have also enjoyed Swift being shown during Chief's games as they can both bond over topics they are interested in being shown at the same time.

Other's though have not appreciated Swift's 53 second appearances in three hour games though believing it is "Ruining the NFL," one user stated on X (formerly known as Twitter).

The NFL though has benefited from showing Swift on screen for short periods of time as it's drastically increased their viewership. Back in 2020, when the same two teams played against each other at the Super Bowl, the Chiefs and the 49ers, only had on average 99 million people watching the game nationwide, while this year had 124.4 people watching.

Swift, though causing some minor discourse online, has brought massive benefits to the NFL and to families.

The Arising Conflicts In Ecuador

The uprising and retaliations of inmates in prisons of Ecuador lead to new records and military responses.

Ecuador, a country in South America, has recently issued a state of emergency with a curfew set to be effective January 25.

These curfews will affect many different Canton regions that have a risk of gang violence. The Canton regions that are high-risk are under a 12:00 to 5:00 AM curfew. Medium risk regions are under a 02:00 to 5:00 AM curfew, and low risk regions are no longer under a curfew.

Ecuador is sliding into a new wave of violence, with record breaking crime rates with the assassination of presidential candidate Fernando Villavicencio being a major highlight.

On January 7, prison authorities made an announcement that José Adolfo Macias, incarcerated leader of Los Lobos, a criminal organization specializing in drug trafficking and hitmen for allied groups, disappeared from custody and governments were unsure of his whereabouts. The announcement had come before Macias' schedule to be transported to a higher security prison.

The news of Macias' escape quickly set off riots in Ecuador's prison systems, with inmates taking hostage of their guards at several penitentiaries.

On January 9, these organized crime groups had detonated improvised explosive devices in places like Cuenca, Los Rios, Esmeraldas,



El Guabo, Loja, and Quito, as well as kidnapped police officers in Los Rios, Machala and Quito.

Another criminal group had raided the TC Television studios in Guayaquil, where the Criminals broadcasted live footage of themselves holding journalists at gunpoint as well as carrying explosives with them.

In one of the prisons, at least one guard has been executed, which was caught on video and uploaded to social media by inmates.

With the dangerous crimes by these groups, there is no easy solution to the problem. The largest groups are engaged in smuggling vast amounts of Colombian cocaine through Ecuadorian ports; the money they make off these imports allows them to continue to corrupt the authorities.

In addition, President Daniel Noboa has declared internal armed conflict and listed 22 criminal groups to be targeted using military force. This list includes major criminal groups such as Los Lobos, Los Choneros, and Los Tuguerones, as well as minor groups operating as gangs.

Since most of these people involved in these organized crimes have been arrested before and prisons are now largely controlled by incarcerated groups and individuals, armed forces can now deploy lethal force against them, treating them as combatants in war.

A National Assembly approved president Noboa's declaration of war as well as leaders of Ecuador's various political parties that announced their support.
